


Prayer

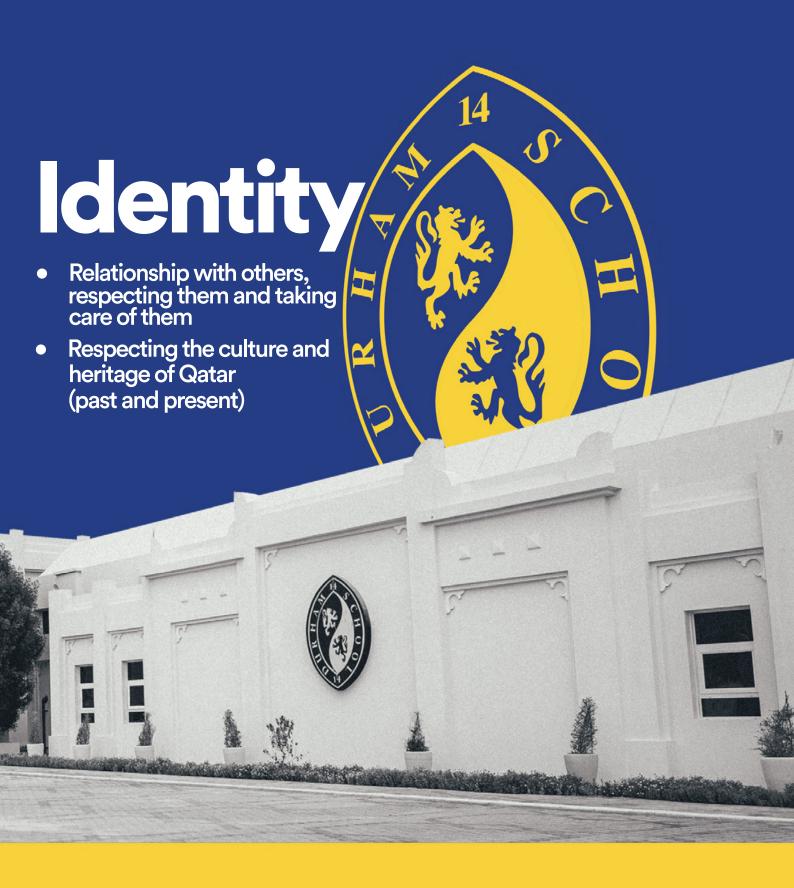



Since opening our doors in September 2019, we have already achieved so many milestones, but our greatest achievement is definitely the growth and consolidation of our Durham Family to over 1,200 girls who demonstrate on a daily basis our values, our desire to be the best that we can be, and the development of Confidence for Life. At Durham, we focus on the whole girl and her wellbeing is central to her achieving her true potential in the classroom and the wider world. We have a strong pastoral framework with each girl having an assigned form tutor who she meets with twice daily for both registration and social, emotional, and academic guidance. There is an opportunity for the girls to explore what it means to be part of the school and society in this ever-changing world and to develop strategies to help with studying, dealing with the typical issues that arise such as friendships, self-belief and just being a woman today. This in line with the Qatari National Vision of 2030. Tutors are supported by Heads of Year who have an overview of the progress of the girls academically, monitor attendance and behaviour, and assist in putting into place any necessary plans to ensure they are making the best of the opportunities provided to them. The Pastoral Deputy Heads have the overall responsibility of guaranteeing these staff have the tools to make a difference and the girls are supported in developing into the Durham girls who will leave us fully equipped to make a difference in whatever area they decide to enter post here.

DSGD also has a school Counsellor who is available for the girls and parents to speak to should they find that life is rather a struggle, and they may need some time to talk through things and look at ways to move forward. Sometimes just getting it off your chest is enough to make you feel better and often find your own way past it.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

At DSGD we offer a varied curriculum to allow each girl to find their own passions and equip them with a wide range of skills to reach their full academic potential. We have a robust curriculum allowing students to experience a diverse timetable featuring practical, creative and investigative learning. This is underpinned by our High Performance Learning Values which are at the heart of all lessons. In KS3 our students follow a school-wide timetable allowing them to experience the growing list of subject areas offered at DSGD and in KS4 and KS5 students have the opportunity to select those subjects which best suit their interests and future careers. Our staff are there every step of the way with our girls from creating engaging lessons, feedback on improving work, to providing advice and guidance on subject option choices. Our teaching staff are supported by Heads of Department who oversee each departments curriculum content, resources, assessment and academic progress and a strong Academic and Pastoral Senior Leadership team.

We also have a school Academic Careers Counsellor who is available for students and parents to discuss subject choices, university options, work experience and future careers. For those students in KS4 and KS5 we have an Exams Officer who coordinates with the International exam boards in preparations for students final IGSCE and AS Level examinations.

In Key Stage 3, girls have HOUSE form rooms with a mixture of Year 7, 8 and 9. This allows the House System to be embedded and to create peer mentors within the mixed ages. The Form Tutors meet with the girls daily and oversee the girls' development liaising with their academic teachers. They will take on the pastoral responsibility for their class and will be the parents' link for all the girls' needs.

Year 7, 8 & 9 pupils at Durham School for Girls are offered a challenging, stimulating curriculum designed to stretch their capabilities. Within our school environment they will develop the time management, communication and study skills required to set them on the road to successful, independent learning in the future.

In Key Stage 3, along with the National Curriculum, girls also follow the Arabic and Islamic Curriculum from the Ministry of Qatar.

Our pupils will find opportunities for both leadership and participation in many different fields; The Girls participate in ALL areas of the curriculum and all subjects such as:

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

In DSGD we want girls to explore and love books and language. Girls will learn to open their minds and step into the world of imagination and literature. All girls will study a rich and exiting range of fiction and nonfiction text. Finding a passion for reading is a whole school aim and is continued and encouraged as girls move through secondary.

High levels of English, both in reading and writing is the core to success in all areas of the curriculum.

What will I learn?

In Key stage 3 girls will study a range of texts and will continue to develop all forms of writing. Girls will have great fun understanding the written word through story writing, posters, presentations, comics, drama and reports. The development of vocabulary is key in Key Stage 3 and girls will been encouraged to be reading for pleasure as well as for studies. Girls will be building on the foundations of the Primary years developing the skills needed for IGCSE.

In KS4 English Language is a compulsory IGCSE. Girls will be expected to analyze, compare and

contrast styles of text and genre. Girls will develop their writing skills to be confident and imaginative writers.

English Literature is an optional IGCSE and AS level. For both the AS and IGCSE girls will need a high level of English to access these courses. With the English Team and the Careers officer, girls will receive individual guidance to participate in this subject.

English for my future.

English is relevant for every aspect of the girl's future, both in university and in careers. The skills learnt from both English Language and Literature allow the girls to be confident both verbally and with the relevant writing skills. The critical skill learnt studying English can be translated to all aspects of life. Careers relating to English could be; Journalism, Education, Law, Politics, Marketing, Translating and the Diplomatic service.

MATHEMATICS

Mathematics is used in every aspect of daily life. From telling the time, to scientific analysis, to working out their bill in the coffee shop! In DSGD we want Mathematics to be relevant and fun. All girls can achieve and can be mathematicians. It is ensuring confidence in the girls that allows us to achieve this. Maths needs to be relevant to the real world and many classes are practical and active to make to their previous results. AS and the subject come to life.

What will I learn?

Maths is taught as a cyclical process in DSGD where every year the same topics are taught, consolidated and extended. This allows girls to be supported and stretched to reach their full potential. In all year groups in KS3, the following topics are covered:

Numbers (e.g. Sets, Ratio, Percentages, Fractions, Decimals, Powers, Surds)

Algebra (e.g. Solving Equations, Accounting. Algebraic Manipulation, Indices, Inequalities, Quadratics, Simultaneous Equations, Linear and Quadratic Graphs, Functions, Calculus) Geometry (e.g. Area, Volume,

Pythagoras, Trigonometry, Transformations, Vectors, Circles, Polygons)

Statistics (e.g. Probability, Averages, Cumulative Frequency, Histograms)

In IGCSE, Mathematics is a compulsory subject. Girls have the option to take higher Maths and this will be determined in accordance Alevel Mathematics will be available, and girls will be supported in this choice regarding university choices and career prospects. Higher Maths can include statistics. Pure Maths and mechanics.

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SCIENCE

In DSGD we celebrate the importance and relevance of science in the world around us and beyond! Asking questions allows our girls to develop their enquiring minds, form a hypothesis and test a theory Science is the subject that shows we never stop learning!

What will I learn?

In KS3 the girls receive classes of general science sudying topics covering the three subjects of Biology, Chemistry and Physics. Topics include; Space, Materials, The Human Body, The living world, Changes, Elements. All topics have practical elements and girls are taught scientific language and laboratory skills. As the girls move into IGCSE's they have the option of taking the Dual Award or a Triple award. The Dual awards is worth 2 IGCSEs and combines the 3 science subjects. For the Triple Science the girls will study Biology, Physics and Chemistry as separate subjects and will receive 3 separate IGCSEs.

For AS and A level, girls will be supported and guided to ensure that they are fulfilling the correct requirements for university courses. Girls for AS and A level can choose from Biology, Physics and Chemistry as separate subjects.

Science for my future

Scientific investigation is used in many fields and professions. Medicine, Research, Pure Science, Astronomy, Engineering, Architecture, ICT, Education, Agriculture are just some professions needing science.

HISTORY

At Durham School for girls, we aim for girls to be investigators of the past and guardians for the future. Through the British Curriculum, there will be a focus on British History, but this will be compared to the world at that time and the impact locally in Qatar. Qatari History is also taught as a compulsory subject in the Arabic curriculum. History transforms us to other times and places and develops in the girls a sense of respect and understanding of those who lived in other times before us.

What will I learn?

In KS3 the girls receive a broad and chronological curriculum starting from the Normans and Saxons through to the modern day. Girls will learn how to analyze historical evidence, understand the past and develop opinion based on fact. Making the past real through newspapers, artifacts, visits and reports brings history to life and allows girls to understand how the world has changed. Girls can continue History as an IGCSE and AS

option in KS4 and KS5.

History in my future.

The skills developed in History are transferable to many other subjects and careers. Being able to write effectively, understand and learn chronological dates and use evidence based critical thinking are all valuable tools for careers such as; Politics, Historian, Archeologist, Lawyer, Journalist, Writer.

GEOGRAPHY

Qatar is such a rich geographical study, all our girls are natural geographers! Our aim is to give the girls the experiences and understanding of the complexities of the world around us. In DSGD we aim for the girls to appreciate the diversity of our planet and those who live in it. Understanding culture, climate, impact, change and development is the future.

What will I learn?

In KS3 girls begin to understand and learn the features and characteristics of both Human and Physical Geography. Topics such as Ecosystems, Rocks, Coasts, Climate, Industry, Settlement, Population, are all covered. Girls are taught to use geographical understanding to form opinion and judgements based on fact. Statistics and ICT are incorporated in lessons as the girls begin to understand and learn about their local environment and the world around us. Girls can continue Geography as an IGCSE and AS option in KS4 and KS5.

Geography in my future.

Like History, the skills learnt in Geography can be transferred to many subjects and careers. Understanding diversity, culture and impact plays a key feature in the future and knowledge of this is a necesity in many university subjects. Careers can include Surveying, Research, Analysis, Politics, Environmental Subjects, Law, Human rights and International relationships.

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ART AND DESIGN

In DSGD we believe every girl is an artist and it is our job to unlock the imagination and creativity of each child. This may be through painting, sculpture, fashion or graphic design. All girls have the opportunity to learn skills and self-expression through different medias and stimuli. Girls are taught to take a risk and have confidence in themselves and their creative thought. Art is about expression and having the support and skillset to become the artist within you.

What will I learn?

Art and design needs to be taught and the skills and techniques form the basis and foundation in the KS3 Curriculum. In KS3 girls will have the opportunity to experience and learn the 3 Art subjects within the school. Art — Painting, Drawing, Sculpture, Colour and Art History. Fashion- Basic design and fashion skills, Sewing and patterns. Food — Basic Cooking skills, Nutrition and Diet.

From this foundation girls can then

move into KS4 and 5 to choose Art and Design (Fashion Component or fine Art) and/or Food and Nutrition as separate IGCSE and AS options.

Art and Design / Fashion/ Food and Nutrition in my future.

The skill of creative expression is priceless. The fundamental skills learnt in fashion and food are practical life skills that will be used daily. Careers relating to these subjects include Fashion Design, Architect, Artist, Graphic Designer, Interior Designer, Illustrator, Nutritionist, Dietitian.

What will I learn?


In KS3 the girls will have a mixture of practical and theory lessons. They will explore and understand different styles of music and gain an appreciation of different musical genre. They will have the opportunity to compose and perform using a variety of instruments, learn pitch and rhythm and notation. Singing forms part of the curriculum and the music department links with the Drama Department regarding musical production. In KS 4 and 5 Music can be an IGCSE and AS option, however, girls studying at this level will need to be competent in an instrument of choice.

ICT AND COMPUTER SCIENCE

With technology moving at such a speed, innovative and current practice is our aim in DSGD. Girls will have the opportunity to learn, develop and respect the digital world of the 21st Century.

Along side the practical lessons of programming and coding, students will also use the facilities of our Virtual reality suit and continually learn online safety and responsibility. Computer Science allows girls to be ready and active for the future.

What will I learn?

In KS 3, Girls will gain experience in computer software and operating systems. Lessons will be practical and programming and coding through Raspberry Pi for Python are used and taught. Online safety and responsibility form part of the curriculum in KS3. As girls move into KS4 and 5, Computer Science and ICT are offered as an IGCSE and AS levels. The curriculum has more depth in complexity around coding and programming and the

use of algorithms.

Computer Science/ ICT for my future.

DRAMA

Drama in DSGD builds confidence and develops positive self esteem in our girls. All girls can play a part in drama, from performer to critic. set designer to makeup artist. Drama allows girls to develop a range of communicative and practical skills to express their creativity. Through drama, the girls will be able to develop literacy skills, but also gain a better understanding of emotion, self and others. Drama overlaps with so many other subjects and gives the girls a greater insight to history, politics, emotions and the world around them. We will unlock the Drama Queen within you.

What will I learn?

In KS3 the girls will have the opportunity for individual, small group and large performance work. They will study a range of scripts and plays and learn theatrical skills, theory and characterization. They will compare film and theater and develop a better understanding of the functions and roles in live performance verses filmed works.

Overlapping with Music, Art and Design, Fashion and ICT, the girls will be able to learn from practical workshops on set design, makeup and costumes. For KS4 and 5, Drama is offered at IGCSE and AS level. Girls will follow the Theatre Arts programme and develop understanding of set texts, performance and characterization in theatre.

Drama in my future.

Not only is Drama a subject, but the skills learnt are transferable to many careers and professions. Work in Journalism, Theater, Film and Television are logical career paths. The confidence in public speaking and performance can be used as a life skill and is needed in many professions such as: Teaching, Law, International Relations, Medicine, Media and Politics.

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THE ARABIC CURRICULUM (ARABIC, QATARI HISTORY AND ISLAMIC)

The Arabic Subjects form an important part of the DSGD overall curriculum. It is fundamental that the girls have a high level of Arabic both written and spoken, A good understanding of Qatari History and strong knowledge and guidance of Islamic. Values are at the heart of every Durham Girl, and the Arabic, language, culture and values forms a fundamental part of the girl's development and learning.

What will I learn?

In KS3, the girls will continue with all 3 mandatory subjects. They will be following the Ministry of Education Qatar Curriculum. All 3 subjects will be taught by the Arabic team and girls will take part in the Ministry examinations and assessments at the end of each year. In KS4, Girls will all take Arabic IGCSE. (All Arabic passport holders will take Arabic first language and International Students will take Arabic as a Second Language.

guage) Islamic will be taught as a MOE subject, but there is also the option to take IGCSE Islamic as an additional subject. In KS5 all girls will take AS Arabic and continue with their Islamic studies.

Arabic for my future.

The mandatory subjects form who the girls are now and how they will develop for their future. For cultural, religious, and personal grounding, these subjects are fundamental. For future options and careers, these subjects will give the girls the foundations to build upon.







Option choices and Career planning.

To enable our students at DSGD to make informed choices about their futures we are embedding Unifrog into our Form Time activities. Unifrog is an online platform where students can easily explore their interests, then find and successfully use this knowledge at the next stage of their school life and beyond. Unifrog allows students to apply their learning to the world of further education and see what pathways will be the right fit for them.

In KS4 and KS5 students will also have the opportunity to attend University Open days as well as University Expo Qatar an annual event showcasing the different university programs offered in Qatar.

IGCSE Qualifications. This is a 2 year programme where the girls will take up to 9 IGCSEs (International General Certificate of Secondary Education). These are awarded by the UK Government and accepted and validated by the Qatar MOE for submission for the Qatar Leavers Certificate.

Islamic and Qatar History are non-exam subjects but must be taught as per the instruction the Ministry of Education. – All students regardless of IGCSE choices, will take part in these lessons.

As we move into Key Stage 5 for Year 12 and Year 13, we are looking to bridge the transition from School to University. We there for call Key stage 5 – College. Girls in this phase of learning are treated with more maturity and begin to have a more adult approach to learning and their future.

Within Year 12 and 13, we offer a range of bespoke programmes catered to our girls' individual needs. All the programmes and subject choices are carefully aligned with the End of School Certificate requirements from the MOE and University entrance needs.

Form, Tutors, Heads of Year, and our College Counsellors all support the girls through this time with choices, applications, and careers advice. Durham School for Girls works closely with the Universities both in Qatar and abroad and we have worked hard to build excellent relationships with them. Day trial visits to Universities, Career and University Fairs, and work experience all allow the girls to make strategic and realistic decisions.

Our Dual Enrolment Program with the State University of New York - Adirondack also allows the girls a valuable experience of university study as well as gaining credits for college classes alongside their British Qualifications. Being able to have these experiences and take part in college courses, supported by the structured environment of Durham, allows, and encourages the girls to be the best they can be. Girls in Key Stage 5 are role models for other girls. These are the girls our younger students aspire to be. Giving them the tools and environment to develop and mature we inspire them to be the best they can be. Confidence for Life.

In Year 12, all girls will be submitted for the AS Arabic and Islamic exam which is covered by the MOE programme for Year 12.

Girls take bespoke programmes combining IGCSE and AS levels to ensure all leavers requirements are fulfilled. A range of IGCSE subjects are available and girls needing additional support will be given an individual learning programme. AS levels can be taken in the following subjects and may alter depending on demand. There are entry level requirements for some subjects and girls' programmes will be decided on a 1:1 interview with the Head of Secondary depending on previous results and general academic and pastoral development.

Durham School for Girls was opened in 2019 as the first British All-Girls School in Qatar. Based on the traditions of over 600 Years from its sister school in the UK, Durham mixes old and new in an innovative and dynamic way. The school has grown from strength to strength and now proudly has nearly 1000 students.

Offering a range of IGCSE qualifications ranging from Business Studies to Fashion Design, Physics to Food and Nutrition, the school addresses the needs and interests of the girls. Emphasis is placed on English, Arabic, Maths and Science and, giving the girls a strong foundation to build upon. As a High-Performance

Learning School, all girls are given the opportunities to believe in themselves and to be the best they can be.

Confidence for life is the school motto and this is addressed through both security in their academics, but also developing the girls to be the best versions of themselves socially and emotionally.

In September 2021, the school will launch its Year 12 classes. These new courses will be a first in Qatar offering an innovative concept of Dual Enrollment. Girls will have the opportunity of following a traditional route to University through the British A 'levels, but also be able to take University credits live alongside their studies. The Dual Enrollment allow qualifying students to enroll in college courses transferable to Universities at Education City, such as Georgetown and Texas A&M and Qatar University, as well as abroad. All whilst still studying in the security of **Durham School.**

In a unique collaboration with State University of New York, (SUNY) the girls will attend live lectures through advanced technology and be a member of a university class, taught by the University faculty. These credits will be recognized by Universities here in Doha allowing Durham Girls to be completing Year 13 and their A 'levels but attending College credits at the same time. This process is the first of its kind in Doha and is fully accredited by the Ministry of Education.

Durham School is delighted to be able to give this opportunity to the girls and can't wait for this programme to start in August 2021.

In Key Stage 4, the girls move onto their IGCSE courses. The International General Certificate of Secondary Education is a two-year course studied in Years 10 and 11. Girls will work with their teachers and parents in Year 9 to develop their individual program for their IGCSE qualifications. It is the aim in Durham School for Girls, that we give the students a range and depth of experiences and opportunities to prepare them for their future.

Girls will continue to take English, Arabic, Maths and Science as compulsory IGCSEs. in addition, Physical Education, PSHE and Islamic are taken throughout Key Stage 4. This will give the girls the balance and enrichment needed.

In Year 10, the girls will take between 6 and 9 IGCSE courses over 2 years. There are obligatory subjects and then girls may choose from the range of options available. All these choices are carefully chosen with both parents, students and school. Guidance and careers advice is ensured throughout these choices.

NOTE: THESE STUBJECTS ARE NOT OFFERED IN KS3

PSYCHOLOGY (KS4 AND KS5)

What is more interesting than learning about what makes us who we are? Psychology looks at how we develop as individuals and what makes us tick. Are we a product of our genetics or of our upbringing is the million-dollar question and this is where we start our journey into the mysteries that are the people we are and who we interact with? Exploring and developing an understanding of the complex nature of human behaviour and experiences and why and how people are different is central to this subject. Questions such as what memory is and why is mine better than hers, how do we communicate without words and why do we show our emotions in different ways in different situations are some that we endeavor to answer during this course. We also focus on how we can 'test' these answers through examining scientific research methods which includes looking at experimental design, results analysis, and ethics.

It combines a range of skills from technical writing, developing scientific methodology to the interpretation of data. It will enable you to present information, develop arguments and draw conclusions through a critical approach to psychological evidence.

Psychology can lead you in numerous directions aside from being some sort of psychologist (sports, forensic, criminal, counsellor, educational support) from teaching to research to business and marketing, advertising, or human resources. It plays a part in all aspects of the world and is also accepted for some medical courses as it has all the rigor of the more traditional sciences.



BUSINESS STUDIES (KS4 AND KS5)

TRAVEL AND TOURISM

What will I learn?

The study of travel and tourism looks behind the scenes at many of the world's most popular tourist destinations and provides students with an appreciation of the scale and importance of the global travel and tourism industry. Girls will view tourist destinations through the eyes of different stakeholders; tourists, residents, hotels, airlines, local businesses and transportation companies. They will use problem solving, data handling and ICT to identify main trends and impacts within the travel industry. Travel and Tourism is taught alongside geography in KS3 and can continue this as an IGCSE and AS option in KS4 and KS5.

Like geography and history, the skills learnt in Travel and Tourism can be transferred to many subjects and careers. Careers can include event planning, business management, customer services, tourism officer and travel coordinator.



Secondary Uniform

Children should wear the correct uniform at all times.

- Footwear should be black shoes.
- Trainers that are white or black can only be worn on P.E days.

Children should not wear:

- Jewellery (exceptions are: one small pair of stud earrings, a wristwatch and a religious bracelet)
- Make up or nail polish

The School uniform supplier is 'Nobel House'. Our uniforms are similar to those at Durham School UK and provide a sense of belonging and pride to be part of the school.

- School bags must also be purchased from 'No House'
- Wheelie bags and bags which are not Durh School bags will not be accepted in school.
- Black school shoes should also be worn.
- Black or white trainers for sports should be purchased.
- Trainers are not acceptable as general school sho
- Jewellery in the form of small stud earrings bracelets for religious purposes are allowed but health and safety, no other jewellery is allowed.

School meals programme

Nutrition and Healthy eating are key elements of the school curriculum and programme.

DSGD provides healthy lunch services on a daily basis to all DSGD girls.

LUNCH TIME

Having a full lunch together underpins the values of Durham School for Girls Doha: making the right choices; trying new things; being sociable etc. All these skills are part of our curriculum and ensure we have well rounded and healthy girls. The food and quality will be closely monitored and assessed. Children with food allergies will be catered for and our dining room is a NUT free zone.

Secondary girls have options to buy lunch through the lunch app, grab lunch at the grab-and-go stand located inside the school, order a hot meal or bring a healthy packed lunch from home.

In EYFS, the girls eat lunch with the EYFS staff and are served directly to the table. EYFS parents will be informed by the teachers if there are any problems with food, or how well the girls ate.

We respect allergies and religious diets. It is parent's responsibility to inform the school of any allergies.

It is very important that the students stay hydrated and so all girls are asked to bring to school a water bottle. This needs to be named clearly and will be returned home daily. Girls will be encouraged to drink water throughout the day and remain hydrated.

SNACK TIME

A snack should be provided by parents and brought into school by the child. All snack bags or boxes need to be named clearly. Snack for EYFS is supervised by the EYFS team and children sit together to eat.
